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State History: All states require state history to be taught during elementary years. State history can be taught using an adopted textbook, or it can be presented as an independent unit utilizing a variety of text and resource books. Carolina Conference North Carolina state history is taught in 4th and 8th grades as part of US History. The suggested book to use is North Carolina, The Tar Heel State, by Dr. Richard Haynes. South Carolina state history is taught in 3rd grade as part of social studies and in 8th grade as part of US History. Georgia-Cumberland Conference Georgia state history is taught in 4th and 8th grades.
