Besides a lifetime of painful memories, Tyler had his hands full with immediate problems. Half his cattle were lost during the worst winter on record and his cowhands were about to quit if he couldn't find a decent cook. Libby Ross fit the bill. She had never seen a man so attractive with such a sour disposition. But she sensed desire behind the wall Ty erected to keep everyone at a distance . . . a wanting so fierce it nearly broke her heart.

Libby is an orphaned cook from Chicago who made the mistake of thinking the young master of the house loved her. She got caught while he was in the process of sexually assaulting her and was kicked out of the house. So she answers a fraudulent mail-order bride ad from a 70...more This book could have been so much better, but it read as a very amateurish venture. It's like the author was just trying to hit all the elements someone told her to, but didn't think about how those elements worked in her plot.

Tyler Hollins grew up on his ranch, left for the city to become a doctor, then returned home upon his dying father's wish. There, he met and fell in lust with his wife Jenna, who hated the ranching life and died in childbirth. Although Tyler is a trained doctor, he couldn't save his wife so now he has issues.

The book could have been good, only it kept pausing and restarting. There was no continuous forward movement through each character's secrets, past, and issues. Rather, they would move forward one step, then two steps back, forward one, two steps back, repeat. After a while, it got really old. By the time the ending came, it didn't make sense why the two characters were suddenly able to "see the light." This made for an unsatisfying ending overall.(less)

I enjoyed Libby Ross' character. She was strong for a woman that had been through several hard hitting life betrayals, yet it seems that she could still hold her head up and smile. She had a delicateness about her but was definitely not afraid of work. The only time I...more I came across this book while looking for another book, and liked the title. However, I almost didn't purchase the book, because a number of the reviews mentioned that there were "so many typos." I found that this was NOT the case.

This book did have all the things I think can make a good book: 1)Betrayal; which doesn't take over the book 2)Lost love; although I think Tyler Hollins may have dwelled on this a little too long 3)Sadness; when a character (even if they are not the main character)dies 4)Found Love; not too quick, or doesn't take too long to get there

Liberty Ross has just buried her husband on the desolate Montana plains. She'd traveled out from Chicago as a mail-order bride, and a mere four months later, her husband has succumbed to pneumonia. Now she must drive the rickety wagon to the nearest town to catch a train back to Chicago. But when she arrives, she discovers she hasn't enough money to buy a ticket.

Her dilemma is solved when two ranch hands overhear the situation and ask her to come back to the ranch. Seems their cook was fired and they can't find another. As fate would have it, Libby worked as a cook for an upscale household in Chicago, so she decides to go with them until she can earn enough to buy her ticket.

Tyler and the hands drive the herd of cattle to Billings and Libby drives the chuck wagon, enduring hardships without complaint, even saving her hard-headed boss' life. As the days lengthen, she finds herself falling in love with Tyler, and in turn, he is finding Libby a huge distraction. Her plan is to board a train in Billings and return to Chicago, however, plans go awry and she returns to the ranch thinking just maybe there's a chance for happiness with Tyler.

Ms. Harrington has told a story of life on a late nineteenth-century Montana ranch with all the ruggedness one would expect. Her secondary characters are superb, and Libby is a gem. I liked Tyler but wanted to kick him when he kept throwing up the same obstacle to his future happiness. Also, I found myself growing a little weary of the lengthy love scenes and wanted to get back to the plot. However, this is a fine read and well worth the price. Ms. Harrington does an excellent job on research and has presented believable ranch life. Very well done.

Unsure what to do next, Libby's uncertain, immediate future is decided when she is offered a job cooking for the Lodestar Ranch. The Lodestar Ranch is completely devoid of feminine presence, and that's the way owner Tyler Hollins prefers it. When he comes home from a business trip and finds Libby in the kitchen, he immediately fires her and orders her from the property. However, when he talks to a few of his men, he realizes that Libby is the only person available to cook for the group, and that the men will not continue to work for him if they aren't given some decent food. With no choice in the matter, he agrees to let Libby stay, but only until he can replace her with a man. Both Libby and Tyler have troubled pasts. While Libby's past is shadowed with humiliation and heartache, Tyler is driven by ghosts and guilt. As Libby tries to keep from

repeating her past mistakes, Tyler continues to deny himself any form of meaningful human companionship. Little by little, Libby learns to trust Tyler, while Tyler slowly releases the guilt that has crippled him emotionally. As each gives to the other, they eventually gain the love that is their's for the taking. Ms. Harrington's characters are believable and her dialogue is worth reading twice. Libby and Tyler are perfect for each other! Alexis Harrington has a winner with A Taste of Heaven! A perfect reason to spend the day reading! Alexis Harrington kept me up late!
