



Agent Box: Handguns, Hard Drives, and Handcuffs: an FBI Memoir in Black and White, Anthony J. Box, Winans Kuentler Publishing, LLC, 2013, 0982946112, 9780982946114, 240 pages. Agent Box is the story of Anthony Box's journey from Chicago's impoverished South Side to his career with the FBI. He was raised by a single mother and, at age sixteen, was shot while trying to catch a mugger. He attended Morehouse College in Atlanta, was a tank commander in the U.S. Army and then began a career as a forensic computer expert with the FBI, where he was one of only a handful of black special agents. While with the FBI, Box investigated white-collar crime and participated in the investigation of the September 11th World Trade Center attacks. Box went on to earn a law degree, as well as a master's degree from Harvard's Kennedy School, and he is currently an investigator for a congressional commission on military contract fraud. He has just finished a tour of duty in Iraq as a judge advocate general. Anthony Box's story is an inspirational African American memoir of achievement in the face of poverty, racism, and violence..
