The admission counselor who covers your territory is your main contact, but you may meet several of us throughout the year. If you have looked at the application, you probably noticed our Quick Takes section, which asks you to tell us about yourself, your role models, favorite food, etc. Since we get to know you so well through your application and through personal contact, we thought we would turn the tables on ourselves so you can learn more about us..

I am a native Californian who grew up in Torrance. Although I had every intention of going to college outside California, I ended up choosing USC and loved every minute of my student experience. I stayed here after graduation and have spent most of my professional career serving in various roles across the university.

USC offers students an academic and social environment unparalleled in American higher education. It is large enough to have something for just about everyone, but is also a place where each individual is respected and receives personal attention. USC's unmatched diversity, along with its values-driven philosophy and academic excellence, results in educational offerings that are truly relevant to the 21st century.

The college search and selection process are all about finding the right fit. Don't become too narrowly focused on one institution. Broaden your horizons and keep your options open; there are more than 2,000 colleges and universities in the U.S., and there is certainly more than one that will be the perfect fit for you.

My roots are in south-central Pennsylvania, but my parents moved to Southern California shortly after I was born. I grew up mostly around Long Beach (a Millikan alum -- go Rams!), and attended USC. I studied filmmaking with a dream to change the world by telling stories that must be told, by

bringing forward voices we all need to hear. A job I thought would be temporary became my dream career, for we in college admission work to change the world every day. What a wonderful, fortunate coincidence.

Think of each part of the application as an opportunity to say something meaningful. Every part of the application â€" from how you present your Activities Summary to what you say in your Short Answer responses â€" should come together to paint a picture of who you are in all of your multidimensionality.

I was a small-town Texan who always dreamed of bright lights and busy city streets, and my high school academic and acting success helped garner a spot in USC's entering class. As a student I worked very closely with New Student Orientation, and I am extremely happy to help interested students gain admission to my alma mater. My passion for education has inspired me to pursue a graduate degree in Educational Counseling at USC's Rossier School of Education.

When I was a freshman, coming to USC and Los Angeles from a small-town suburb of Sacramento was quite a step outside of my comfort zone – though in hindsight one of the best decisions I have made. I became interested in admissions after working as an intern in the office while an undergraduate, and have been proud to serve my alma mater since graduation.

People often talk in clichés and hyperbole about how your years as an undergraduate are the best years of your life. But, once you attend USC and explore all of the opportunities the university and surrounding Los Angeles area have to offer, you begin to truly understand why people talk this way. USC provides its students a diverse and wholly welcoming collegiate experience that rivals any in the nation.

So you've taken a rigorous academic course load, completed your standardized tests and participated in your extracurricular activities. Those parts of your application are extremely important, but primarily in the past. Use your time now to take advantage of what you can control: the essay and short answers. We aren't looking for safe, stock answers. Instead we want to read your application and immediately get a sense of your unique personality.

Approach your college search knowing there is more than one university where you can be happy and flourish (in fact, there are many!). Keep that perspective throughtout the process and your stress level will decrease. Also, be yourself! Colleges are looking for authenticity in applications. An authentic and real application shines on its own.

I have been working in college admission and Student Affairs roles for the past nine years and have loved every minute of it. I have a very eclectic taste in music and Puerto Rico is always in my heart!
